Definition

Pictures or graphics accompanying verbal or textual instruction.

Benefits

Visual supports, and having information presented in different ways and multiple times, will aid all learners.

Using visual supports can have a positive effect on your child's engagement by communicating expectations to your child such as what they need to do, when, how long for and what comes next.

Using this tip

Visual supports can come in many forms, as illustrated in the table below.

Drawing the eye to important information	• bolding , highlighting, underlining,	
	enlarging or changing the colour of important information in a line of text.	
Information/reminders on walls/desks	Display charts of information and pictures related to the topic on the wall.	
Behavioural examples (voice scale) 5	 Display expectations and rules on a wall in writing and include pictures of your child modelling the desired behaviours. Attach a voice scale to a wall to help remind children to use an 'inside' voice. 	
Examples demonstrating a task or product	Make an example of a document or product to demonstrate to your child exactly what is expected.	
Graphic organisers	 Venn diagram PMI (Plus, Minus, Interesting) chart Mind map KWL (Know, Want to Know, Learned) chart Fishbone diagram
